### **Mosquitoes & Stormwater**

"If you are concerned for your health and well-being and the excitement over Zika carrying mosquitoes makes you ready to drain the swamp, step back and take a breath. Clean your gutters, flush your



birdbath, encourage your neighbors to do the same and relax. Take the usual precautions to avoid mosquito bites and enjoy being outside." -Ohio Wetlands Association Newsletter; May 2016.

There are over 2500 different kinds of mosquitoes in the world. OSU entomologist, Dr Piermarini says "Zika virus is transmitted by species of Aedes mosquitoes. Aedes aegypti appears to be the most efficient at spreading

# **Creeking Programs for Families**

Butler SWCD and Metroparks of Butler County are hosting a number of creeking programs this summer. During these programs we look for aquatic creatures, and if the creeks are too dry, we look for fossils.

All programs being at 10 am Please see the program flier for addresses for each location.

Shoes are required. Please no flipflops.

 June 16, Forest Run MetroPark Wildlife Preserve Area Zika. Aedes aegypti is **not** found in Ohio, but it is common in the southern U.S." Some other Aedes species are rarely in Ohio, but their capacity to transmit the Zika virus is not well described, and it's unlikely they would bring the virus into Ohio.

Aedes mosquitoes are *not* known to breed on surface waters; however they do lay their eggs in tiny 'divots' of water, thereby associating themselves with urban environments. By draining wetlands, we are not removing Aedes bredding grounds, instead we actually removing dragonflies and other mosquito predators, allowing the mosquito population to multiply.

So although we are unlikely to catch Zika, there are other diseases that our local mosquitoes are known to carry. Several precautions can be taken as a homeowner to reduce the likelihood of mosquito reproduction in the area. Inviting their predators to your back yard is a great start. Bats can consume up to 1,000 mosquitoes in 24 hours, dragonflies too can eat hundreds within a day. Bat houses are widely available for purchase online and at many local supply stores.

Rain barrels are a very useful tool for alleviating storm water issues around building foundations and for watering flower beds. Although many systems are "closed", like the ones for sale at the Butler SWCD office, several do-it-yourself styles should be inspected for the likelihood of rain accumulation on the lid, and ease of insect access. A few small drainage holes can be drilled around the barrel lid, or spray foam to fill the lid, to better prevent puddle formation.

Be sure to keep a few kinds of repellants on hand this summer, especially when spending long periods of time outdoors. Useful insect repellents come in several forms today, and are easy to make at home as well. A few repellents include citronella candles, chemical bug sprays, travel wipes, sunscreens, wrist bands, homemade lavender oil sprays, neem oil, and natural incense.

Lastly, there are a lovely variety of plants and herbs that may help repel these pests including: citronella, lemon

## **Great Miami River Named a National Water Trail System**

The Great Miami Watershed Water Trail has been named a National Water Trail System by the Secretary of the Interior—a designation that could lead to more riverfront investment. The water trail includes the Great Miami, Stillwater and Mad rivers and is the only national water trail in Ohio, and one of only 22 in the nation!

The national trail designation assures paddlers that the water trail incorporates best management practices in a variety of areas including trail design, maintenance, recreation, conservation and public information. Water trails are recreational routes on waterways, such as rivers, with a network of public access points. The Great Miami River Watershed Water Trail boasts 291 miles of waterway accessible to recreational boaters, anglers and wildlife watchers.

The program is jointly administered by the National Park Service and the U.S. Forest Service, in conjunction with a number of federal and not-for-profit partners.

## Sampling Reminders

- Please mark the time and date on your labels of when you collected the sample. None of the sample times should be the same unless you are a time traveler
- Sign your sample into the cooler with the drop off time.
- Don't put the samples in the bag with the clean bottles
- Keep the cooler lid closed as much as possible
- Provide labels that say dry, or too low to sample, if that is the case.
- The combination of the cooler lock is 2278 which is

BCST if you look at your phone keypad.

- Remember the cooler lock is weird, and that the numbers don't line up along the middle.
- Duplicate samples when you sign them into the cooler, put the number "2" next to the sample ID.
- **Duplicate samples** use the month that is on the label. Remember to talk to Teresa if you will be out of town that month and she can switch dates for you.
