
# <u>Spring rain and green grass - don't get carried away with fertilizer...</u>

As we head into spring ... (even though we hardly had a winter!) ... everyone's thoughts are probably turning to what their yards will look like this summer. I just attended a full day at the Cincinnati Zoo where numerous knowledgeable people talked about a relatively new idea called "sustainable landscaping". This style of landscaping strives to decrease the input of fossil fuels and other resources into lawns while increasing the value of our lawns and gardens to our ecosystems and wildlife. The ideas include, among other things, philosophies like:

- decreasing the size of your lawn;
- when possible, choosing native species that thrive in our climate for beds and trees/shrubs; and
- managing watering, pesticides and fertilizers to minimize runoff, keeping nutrients and nasty chemicals out of our streams.

For streams, the last item is of great importance, since nutrient-laden runoff winds up in our streams and lakes, spurring the growth of algae. If you want to learn more, <a href="here">here</a> is a great new resource from the USEPA. Meanwhile, below are several things you can do to limit your nutrient loading.

Before fertilizing, test your soil. Butler

Extension form that would need to be filled out.

- Fertilize only when needed, as determined by soil tests, not by the folks who make money fertilizing your lawn! In the case of fertilizer, some is good, but more is not necessarily better.
- Choose fertilizer contents based on those soil tests; adding nutrients that are not needed wastes money and hurts our streams. Many cities and states have banned phosphorus in lawn fertilizers, since one dose of phosphorus lasts a long, long time. Butler County does not ban phosphorus on lawns, but the Storm Water and Soil and Water Districts have contributed several news articles and bulletin boards to educate the public.



- Water your lawn properly. Don't overwater, which allows nutrients to run off or leach deep into the soil, unavailable to turf. Set your sprinklers to provide water to your plants .. not the sidewalk!
- Apply fertilizer to the lawn, not the sidewalk. That bit that goes onto the sidewalk has no chance of being absorbed by your plants, but instead generally goes straight into our streams.
